FROM THE DIRECTOR

Fall is upon us and some nights have been downright chilly.

The thermostats at the Center are now on the System Setting HEAT. The thermostats are no longer locked, which makes it easier for the individual groups to adjust the room temperature.

HOWEVER, please note that the last person(s) leaving the building in the afternoon or evening will have to make sure that all FOUR thermostats (one in the library, one in the reception area and two in the Great Room) have exactly the same setting: HEAT – 65 degrees F.

On the left side, the thermostat shows the actual room (Inside) temperature. On the right, it shows the Temperature Setting. The little arrow buttons to the right of the Temperature Setting can be used to either increase or decrease the temperature. During the daytime/active hours in the winter months, this temperature can be increased to 72 degrees F.

In addition, please bear in mind that the two thermostats in the Great Room must always show identical settings. The same applies to the thermostat in the library and the thermostat in the reception area, i.e., if you increase the temperature in the library to 72 degrees, the temperature in the reception area also has to be increased to 72 degree. This guarantees maximum efficiency.

As Carolyn has mentioned, after Thanksgiving we will start to dig out our Christmas decorations. But since there are games and activities going on during the week, it's best to do some serious decorating on December 4th, the first Saturday in December, at 1PM. That should help us to get into the Christmas Spirit.

TOTH BOARD NOTES

From the November 8, 2021 Board meeting:

Voting started for our annual election of officers & board of directors, which will culminate at our annual business meeting on November 15th at noon. Individually wrapped snacks will be served at the meeting since the kitchen will still be closed.

Frank Mignoli reported on the current COVID-19 status – infection numbers continue to be unstable. Decision made to keep kitchen & icemaker closed for another month. Will revisit decision early if substantial change in COVID-19 status.

Replacement committee gave final update on the items purchased due to the flood.

The transfer of \$6,000 from the Memorial Fund was approved to pay for the renovations made in the reception area. A plaque to commemorate will be placed in the area.

Database programs were discussed. Will poll our members to see their comfort level in transitioning to a cloud-based membership program.

A final update on the Gazette survey was given showing overwhelming support for members receiving the Gazette online. The new modified PDF/USPS program will roll out in January.

Final update from the Bylaws and Policies & Procedures review committee given. BOD approved changes will be presented to the membership at the annual meeting for their approval.

Updates to Article VI: Meetings/Section 1: Business Meetings and Article VI: Meetings/Section 3: Quorum of the Bylaws were made.

The Center's internet and phone system were reviewed. Will update to be able to offer our members internet access while maintaining secure data on the Center computers.

The policy covering internet access was updated to reflect the approved changes.

The membership chair position was discussed as Gerri West is retiring from that long-held position. Will reach out for interest at the membership meeting.

The need for someone to shadow Dick Planck in 2022 to learn the treasurer's position was discussed. Dick has advised that 2022 will be his last year as Treasurer. Will again reach out to the membership.

Frank Mignoli offered an interesting bit of information on the TOTH membership demographics and will update the comparison again in February 2022.

Income for October was \$13,483.34 and expenses were \$1,889,99 resulting in a net income of \$11,593.35. The major source of income was \$1,299.50 from membership dues. We also received an insurance payment of \$11,938.03 which was used to pay for storage expenses incurred due to the flooding.

Our investments increased in value by \$694.35.



COVID-19 UPDATE — DECEMBER 2021

COVID-19 Risk Stages and Vaccinations

The basis for determining the risk stage was the 7-day average of the number of new COVID-19 cases admitted to the hospital. There are two areas being monitored. One is published by Austin Public Health (APH) which reports on Travis County. The other is published by Department of Safety and Health Services (DSHS) and covers a much larger area (11 counties) that includes Travis and Williamson Counties which represent over 75% of the population. As of November 16th, DSHS are reporting values that are in Stage 2, which means the range of the 7-day average of new COVID-19 hospitalizations are between 15-29. However, APH has been reporting 7 day new daily COVID-19 hospitalizations less than 15 since October 25th. On November 16th the 7-day average was 13. This would mean Stage: 2 which equals Stage: 1 risk states; "Participate in indoor or outdoor private gatherings and dine or shop without precautions. Travel with precautions." Stage 3: risk states; Participate in indoor private gatherings with precautions, and in outdoor gatherings without precautions. High-risk individuals may dine with precautions, while low risk individuals may dine without precautions.

Then, during the week of November 8th, APH came up with another parameter for measuring COVID-19 risk. It's called Community Transmission Rate (CTR). The parameter determines the number of new COVID-19 cases in the last 7 days divided by the total county population divided by 100,000. Based on this parameter and the selected values the CTR was in stage 4 while the original parameter was in Stage 2. This is very inconsistent. As of November 16th, the CTR for Travis County rose to 65.6 and now is in Stage 4. To get to Stage 2 the value would have to be between 5 and 10. In regards to Williamson the CTR was 71.7 still in Stage 4. The wide variation in results between the two parameters is very disconcerting. Based on the new parameter, it may be difficult to reach Stage 2.

Vaccination Data

As of November 17th, eleven months since the first vaccination was administered, total vaccinations for Texas and the two nearest counties show the following:

The above fully vaccinated numbers do not include booster shots. Both the Pfizer vaccine booster shot and the third (½ dose) of Moderna are now in use and are recommended for use by the elderly and those that are taking medication for a weakened immune system.

Hospitalizations

In Texas, on October 16th there were about 5,300 COVID-19 hospitalizations. The 7-day average was slightly higher. By November 16th, the number of COVID-19 hospitalizations had fallen to below 2,800 as well as the 7-day average. In the Travis/Williamson County area the COVID-19 hospitalizations had dropped to less than 140 as well as the 7-day average. The 7-day average of the percentage of COVID-19 hospitalizations of all patients had fallen to around 3.2%.

COVID-19 UPDATE

Booster Shots

The CDC recommends the following:

- People who received a primary mRNA COVID-19 vaccine series and are 65 years and older, 50 –64 years with underlying medical conditions, or 18 years and older who live in long-term care settings should receive a booster shot at least 6 months after completing the primary series (which may include an additional primary dose in persons with moderate to severe immune compromise).
- Any of the COVID-19 vaccines authorized in the United States may be taken.

The Nominating Committee presented the slate of nominees for the 2022 Board. The Board unanimously approved and accepted the slate.

The October 18th member meeting was reviewed. Nominations from the floor will be taken for the 2022 Board and the candidates approved by the Board will be available to meet and greet. Individually wrapped snacks were approved for the meeting.

Frank Mignoli reported on the Covid status. It was agreed to allow members to start bringing a sack lunch and their own beverage into the Center with the understanding that there will be no eating at any shared work stations or games tables. This stipulation has no bearing on Covid and will remain in effect permanently moving forward for sanitary reasons.

The Executive Committee reported authorizing the purchase of six more hard-top card tables to replace worn out ones.

Cloud-based database programs were discussed and will be reviewed in more detail next month.

The Executive Committee reported authorizing a Memorial Garden annual budget at \$300 per year. The Managing Director will maintain and authorize expenses prior to purchase.



2021 Bylaws Review Proposed Changes

Article V – Section 2A

The Board of Directors, also referred to as the Board, shall have not more than twelve nor fewer than five active members.

Update the word (individuals) to active members

Article VI - Section A2

When receiving a ballot at the Annual Meeting or prior thereto (as set forth in <u>the</u> Policy & Procedures on Elections), members must place their initials after their name on the list.

Change the word (a) to the

Article VII – Committees

Reorganize first paragraph for better clarity. Recommend opening sentence and then break to Sections.

The Board shall establish and define the purpose of committees, as required, to manage and conduct the business of TOTH.

Section 1. Non-Standing Committees

The President, with approval of the Board, shall appoint the chairperson of (such) non-standing committees. Committee members shall be selected by the chairperson of the committee. The Board shall discontinue such committees upon completion of the specific assignment or when the need no longer exists. (Other committees shall report to the President, or to a member of the Board, as designated when the committee is formed.)

Remove word such

Remove superfluous sentence – superfluous "Other committees...."

BYLAWS REVISION 2021—continued

Section 2. Standing Committees

Standing Committees shall report to the Board of Directors. There shall be <u>four</u> Standing Committees:

Move Standing Committees line from non-standing paragraph to under the standing committee heading.

There are four standing committees: Nominating, Finance, Special Events & Resource Development, and Publicity & Public Awareness.

Bylaws Revision 2021 – Article VII continued

Section 2D – The Publicity and Public Awareness Committee

The Committee shall develop and utilize an email list to make announcements (once) a few days before the event, and again the day before the event.

Remove the word once and add the word again as noted.

Miscellaneous

Revisions and amendments notations are not necessary on the front page — they are part of the last page. Will add the revision date at the bottom of front page for clarification.

BYLAWS + P&P REVIEW INSTRUCTIONS TO MEMBERS

Your Board of Directors performed a review of the Bylaws and Policy & Procedures, and found several items requiring updates.

Some of the items were simple grammatical or typographical errors, some were clarifications on confusing sentence structure & wording, while others were amendments or revisions to existing policies to bring them current with the Center today.

Attached is a list of the proposed changes to the TOTH Bylaws that have been approved by the Board of Directors and will need membership approval. You are being provided this document to show where the changes are being made. All changes are shown in bold print. If a word, phrase, or paragraph has been eliminated – it is shown as (---). If a word, phrase, or paragraph is underlined – then is has only been changed.

These changes will be voted upon during the November 15, 2021 Annual Business Meeting. We will not go through all the changes at that meeting, but will answer any questions. I am also available any time prior to the meeting if you have questions on the document. If there is a change which any member feels should not be made — that change will be voted upon. At the end of the discussion period, there will be a vote to accept or reject the Proposed Changes to the Bylaws with any changes that are approved during the discussion.

Covid-19 Update -October 2021 By Frank Mignoli

Covid-19 Cases and Vaccinations

I was able to find the criteria for the definitions of the five (5) (actually only four (4)) Stages of COVID-19 Risk in the Austin area. The basis is the 7-day average of the number of new COVID-19 cases admitted to the hospital in the Austin Area. We are currently in Stage 3, which means the range of the 7-day average of new COVID-19 hospitalizations is 15-29. On October 16th the new COVID-19 patients hospitalized was 27 and the 7-day average over 28. To get to Stage 2 (same as Stage 1) the 7-day average would have to be less than 15 new COVID-19 hospitalizations the previous day.

As of October 16th, ten months since the first vaccination was administered, total vaccinations for Texas and the two nearest counties show the following:

In the state of Texas we have less than 80% of the population fully vaccinated. The Pfizer vaccine booster shot has been approved for the elderly and those that have a condition or are taking medication that weakens their immune system. The third (booster, ½ dose) of Modera has been approved for EU by the FDA. All it needs now is the CDC to approve it. The Austin area is in stage 3 of risk-based guidelines for the vaccinated. Masks are not required for low risk dining areas and shopping.

<u>Hospitalizations</u> — In Texas, on September 17th there were 12,246 COVID-19 hospitalizations and they kept dropping. The 7-day average was slightly higher. By October 16, the number of COVID-19 hospitalizations had fallen to around 5,300 and the 7-day average less than 6,000. In the Travis/Williamson County area the COVID-19 hospitalizations had drop to less than 240 with a 7-day average of less than 260. The 7-day average of the percentage of COVID-19 hospitalizations o all patients had fallen to less than 6.3%.

<u>Masks</u> — Stage 3 states "Participate in indoor private gatherings with precautions, and outdoor gatherings without precautions. High-risk individuals may dine with precautions, while low-risk individuals may dine without precautions." However, the definition of "precautions" is not stated. Assumptions could be made that masks serve as a "precaution" and being vaccinated can put you in a low-risk category. We find that masks are prevalent at groceries and other large gathering events. While at most outdoor activities very few masks are worn.

I am happy to announce that Thursday rubber bridge is resuming on a weekly basis. We will go back to the usual time frame of playing from 9:45 AM to 2:00 PM or earlier. We will all contribute \$1 to the kitty for the prizes at the end of play. When you sign in on Thursday mornings, you can also sign up for the next week if you know you can play. If we end up with extra names over four per table, you will be considered a substitute for that week only—and may be called at the last minute to play. I will call you as soon as possible if that's the case. Yes, it does help to come early! Covid-19 Cases and Vaccinations

Well, I decided to start up my updates again because of the Delta variant, but will minimize the article length to only Texas.

As of September 16th, nine months since the first vaccination was administered, total vaccinations for Texas and the 2 nearest counties show the following:

	<u>Texas</u>	<u>Travis Co.</u>	Williamson Co.
One Dose administered	16,963,000	873,400	383,700
Fully Vaccinated	14,390,000	759,100	336,100
Fully Vaccinated % (1)	74.4%	81.9%	80.8%

(1) Of 80% of Population

In the State of Texas we have less than 80% of the population fully vaccinated. They are now talking about a 3rd booster shot for the elderly and those that have a condition or are taking medication that weakens their immune system. The Austin area is in Stage 5 of risk-based guidelines for the vaccinated. When we reach Stage 3, masks are not required for low risk dining areas and shopping.

Hospitalizations

In Texas in late August the 7 day average of COVID-19 hospitalizations was over 12,000 and as of September 16th it was slightly under 13,000 but is coming down. The 7 day average of daily hospitalizations in the Travis/Williamson Counties area went over 15% (critical point) on August 13, 2021. This is due to the Covid-19 Delta variance which is more contagious. On September 12th it reached its highest at 18.8%. The 7 day average on September 16th was still about 14% but dropping slightly daily.

Masks

The CDC's recommendations as of late August were that if you are not fully vaccinated and age 2 or older you should wear a mask in indoor public places. In general you do not need to wear a mask in outdoor settings. However, in areas with high numbers of COVID-19 cases, then consider wearing a mask in crowded outdoor settings and for activities with close contact with others who are not fully vaccinated. Do "not" choose masks that:

Are made of fabric that make it hard to breathe, e.g., vinyl Have exhalation valves or vents which allow virus particles to escape Are prioritized for healthcare workers, including 95 respirators.



After all new items have been purchased and the building is back open—the fixed assets should be reviewed and updated.

A survey polling our members for their interest in receiving an electronic copy of the Gazette was approved, with the understanding that mailed (USPS) versions will also be a continued option along with access on our website.

The Board accepted Dodie Domanski's resignation as Editor of the Gazette, effective December 31, 2021.

If anyone is interested in the Editor position, please contact a Board Member or Lisa Leirvaag.

Reaffirming of membership when we reopen was discussed. The need for a Waiver of Liability and Hold Harmless agreement was reviewed. A reaffirming membership packet will be generated for reopening along with the appropriate signage for the doors.

Membership files for married couples were discussed. The Managing Director will ensure that all members have separate file folders when the Center is reopened.

Membership dues were discussed. A motion was approved stating that members in good standing will receive a credit of \$12.50 off their 2022 membership fee. This is to reflect the 6 months of usage lost between 2020-2021. A motion was also approved stating that new members wishing to join for the remainder of this year, and paying for 2022, will be allowed access to all 2021 functions. A discussion was held on the possibility of raising the 2022 dues to \$30 per member. Decision was to maintain our current annual fee of \$25 for 2022 and revisit the increase possibility for 2023.

The church contract expires in September of this year. Discussion was held on renewing their contract for the next 3 years.

The August Board meeting will include discussion on Board vacancies for 2022.

Covid-19 Update -August 2021

Covid-19 Cases and Vaccinations

This will be the last Covid-19 Update. In regards to "Herd Immunity", theoretically at the current rates of Covid-19 cases and the number of vaccinations we may not reach it till early next year. The controversy over vaccinations for children ages 12-15 and under continues. The long term consequences and do children really need them are the issues. What is still important is the number of new cases and the number of hospitalizations. The latest "Delta" strain is reported to be more contagious.

In the US, the daily vaccinations have dropped from about 1.18 million a day to about 0.57 million. As of July 16^{th} , there were 185,400,000 people that have received their first dose of the vaccine and 160,700,000 million being fully vaccinated. That's a 7-day average daily rate of only about 0.27 million for first vaccinations and 0.25 million for 2^{nd} dose. The total doses are expected to decrease some more from now on in spite of the government's efforts to promote vaccinations.

In the US, the total Covid-19 cases have only increased by less than 400,000 in the last month to be around 34 million. Between the fully vaccinated and those that acquired immunity due to contracting the virus, we are at almost 64% of the US population that have immunity from Covid-19.

As of July 16th, seven months since the first vaccination was administered, total vaccinations for Texas and the two nearest counties show the following:

^{*80%} of population and % includes fully vaccinated, estimated cases and a reduced average efficacy of the vaccinations of 75%.

Since June 16th in the state of Texas the daily vaccinations have decreased drastically to about 52,000 per day. Thus the estimated date to reach herd immunity has been extended to well into 2022. There's a possibility of needing booster shots. Only time will tell. Travis County and Williamson counties have decreased too but not as much. Williamson and Travis Counties are running about 3 weeks earlier than State of Texas to about the end of March, 2022 to reach herd reach herd immunity. If we lower

"Herd" Immunity to 75% of the population, the date to reach this milestone, at the current rates of vaccinations, would improve by about 5-7 weeks. However, they still don't know how long the vaccines remain effective which really muddles the water.

Hospitalizations

Since June 15th the 7 day average of daily hospitalizations in the Travis/Williamson area decreased till until the end of June but has been on the rise since. Now it is almost doubled since June 15th. This could be due to the Covid-19 Delta variance which is more contagious. The 7-day average for hospitalizations is almost 2,400 per day which is about 800 more than it was on June 16th. The critical point is when Covid-19 hospitalized patients are 15% or more of the hospitalized patients. Currently in Travis and Williamson County area, the 7-day average is running at around 3.2% and shows no sign of leveling off. This is 1.2% higher than it was on June 15th. This is concerning if it continues to rise.

Masks

The CDC finally lifted mask wearing both indoors and outdoors for those that have been vaccinated. Most places in Texas are following these guidelines. However, due to the Delta variance it is still recommended that those that have not been vaccinated wear a mask indoors or in a crowd of people.

TOTH Vaccination Progress

As of July 16th, one hundred and sixty-five (165) members have reported on their Covid-19 vaccinations. One hundred and fifty-eight (158) are fully vaccinated including sixteen (16) who have received the one-shot Johnson & Johnson (J & J) vaccine. Only one has elected not to get the 2nd dose due to reactions to the first dose of Moderna. Five (5) are not getting vaccinated at this time. One (1) had contracted the Covid-19 virus but is still considering to get vaccinated or not. However, two who had contracted Covid-19 have since gotten vaccinated with the one dose J & J. Except for twenty-six (26) who received the Pfizer vaccine and sixteen (16) who have received the J & J vaccine, all others received the two-shot Moderna vaccine. We currently have listed about 277 members. We now have 158 fully vaccinated and one (1) who have contracted the virus. Thus about 57% of the Center members who have reported are relatively immune. The percentage is definitely higher since I'm sure not everyone has reported and a few on the list are either out-of-town members or do not actually visit the Center.

Covid-19 Cases and Vaccinations

Is "Herd Immunity" really important now? Maybe or maybe not. Even the number of people fully vaccinated seems less important. How many children ages 12-15 are getting vaccinated seems to be the latest controversy. Is it really necessary? Some experts do not believe it is and worry about the long term consequences to children. What is important is the number of new cases and the number of hospitalizations. Fortunately, we seem to be decreasing just slightly.

In the US, the daily vaccinations have dropped from about 2.1 million a day to about 1.18 million. As of June 15th, there were 174,674,000 people that have received their first dose of the vaccine and 145,768,000 million being fully vaccinated. That's a 7-day average daily rate of only about 0.42 million for first vaccinations and 0.76 million for 2nd dose. The total doses are about 55% of what they were a month ago. The total doses are expected to decrease some more in the next month unless many of those 12-15 get vaccinated.

In the US, the total Covid-19 cases are reported to be around 33.6 million and the 7-day daily average is now around 10,000 down from 34,600 on May 16th. As a positive note, the daily cases and hospitalizations may be so low that it could no longer be classified as a pandemic. Let's hope.

As of June 15th, six months since the first vaccination was administered, total vaccinations for Texas and the two nearest counties show the following:

Since May 16th in the state of Texas the daily vaccinations have decreased by about 1/3. Thus the estimated date to reach herd immunity has been extended by over 2

months. Travis County and Williamson counties have decreased too but not as much. Travis and Williamson counties are running between 2-3 weeks ahead of the state of Texas. Travis County is now estimated to reach herd immunity early in October. Next month, it will be interesting to see if the daily vaccination rate continues to decrease now that children ages 12-15 can be vaccinated. It's been reported that over 20% of children 16 and under have contracted Covid-19.

Hospitalizations

Since May 16th the 7 day average of daily hospitalizations due to Covid-19 has decreased from 2,350 per day to around 1,580. The critical point is when Covid-19 hospitalized patients are 15% or more of the hospitalized patients. Currently in Travis and Williamson Counties area, the 7-day average is running at around 2.0% down from 3% on May 16th.

Masks

The CDC finally lifted mask wearing both indoors and outdoors for those that have been vaccinated. Most places in Texas are following these guidelines. However, some people still wear masks. The rules for opening the Center have not been established yet. But being vaccinated will be evaluated thoroughly.

TOTH Vaccination Progress

As of June 15th, there is information on one hundred and sixty-two (162) members. One hundred and fifty-five (155) are fully vaccinated including fifteen (15) who have received the one-shot Johnson & Johnson (J & J) vaccine. Senior Expo will be cancelled this year due to the pandemic and our inability to get back into the Center which is still undergoing storm damage repairs.

Reopening of the Center timeline was discussed. We don't have a definitive date yet because we can't control the repairs being done by the City — but are hoping to be reopen by September.

Reviewed the damage done to the contents of the Center. Salvaged items were either moved into the on-site storage unit in the parking lot or one of the two temperature controlled storage units we rented.

Reviewed the City's plans for putting the Center back together. Carpet will go back where carpet was before but will be slightly lighter than what was originally there. It is the same carpet & color as the center walkways in the Cedar Park Library. Laminate flooring will go back into the TV Room. COVID-19 UPDATE

Covid-19 Cases and Vaccinations

Is "Herd Immunity" really possible? Hopefully, the CDC's latest elimination of masks both indoors and outdoors for those who have been vaccinated might make those hesitant to get vaccinated do so. I'm still trying to determine how close we are to this theoretical percentage of people that are immune. The date to reach Herd Immunity will be extended if the rate of vaccinations continues to decrease. It appears a large percentage of people are not willing to get vaccinated and how many children ages 12-15 get vaccinated. Well almost the day after April 16 the daily vaccination rate have decreased. Of course, the blood clot problem with Johnson and Johnson vaccine (six (6) women between 18 and 48 with one (1) death) had caused the CDC to suspend the use of the vaccine did not help the situation. However, they did lift the suspension after a short period of time on the basis the benefit of the vaccination overwhelming outweighs the risk of getting the blood clot disease. Everyone who receives the shot should receive an information sheet mentioning the rare clotting problem and the symptoms to look out for, officials said. Providers also will be given information about the condition and the appropriate treatment for managing it. Also in early May the FDA has given Pfizer vaccine EUA for children 12 to 15. Vaccines should be available before the end of May. Many experts do not think it is necessary since there is a low chance of this age group getting the virus and further more passing it on. The Kaiser Family Foundation found that in parents of children ages 12-15, 3 in 10 said they will get their children vaccinated right away once it is available for their teens; 26% said they would wait to see how it is working; 18% will get their child vaccinated only if their school requires it; and 23% said they won't get their child vaccinated.

In the US, the daily vaccinations have dropped from over 3.67 million a day to about 2.1 million. As of May 16th, there were 157,500,000 people that have received their first dose of the vaccine and 123,200,000 million being fully vaccinated. That's a 7-day average daily rate of only about 0.75 million for first vaccinations and 1.3 million for 2nd dose. The total doses are about 55% of what they were a month ago. The total doses are expected to decrease some more in the next month unless many of those 12-15 get vaccinated.

In the US, the total Covid-19 cases are reported to be around 33.1 million and the daily 7 -day average is now around 34,800 down from 59,500 on April 16th.

A mathematical formula that I developed that includes the latest estimated cases, current vaccination data and revised lower estimated efficacy rate shows the estimated herd immunity date has been extended by about a month in the United States since April 16th. We would reach Herd Immunity (80% of population) in the United States in the beginning of August. As a positive note even if we don't reach full herd immunity, the daily cases and hospitalizations may be so low that it could no longer be classified as a pandemic. Let's hope.

As of May 16th, five months since the first vaccination was administered, total vaccinations for Texas and the two nearest counties show the following:

^{*80%} of population and % includes fully vaccinated, estimated cases and a reduced average efficacy of the vaccinations of 75%. Of course this does not take into account the percentage of adults who decide not to get vaccinated and also on how many children ages 12-15 get vaccinated.

Since April 16th in the state of Texas the daily vaccinations have decreased by more than a third. Thus the estimated date to reach herd immunity has been extended by more than a month. Travis County and Williamson counties have decreased too but not as much. Travis and Williamson counties are running about 3 weeks ahead of the state of Texas and are estimated to reach herd immunity in the early August. Next month, it will be interesting to see if the daily vaccination rate continues to decrease now that children ages 12-15 can be vaccinated. It's been reported that over 20% of children 16 and under have contracted Covid-19.

Hospitalizations

Daily hospitalizations due to Covid-19 peaked twice in Texas in the past 10 months. Once on 7/21/2020 at 10,893 beds and again on 1/11/21 at 14,218 beds. Since April 28th the 7 day average of daily hospitalizations due to Covid-19 has decreased from 2,605 per day to less than 2,350. The critical point is when Covid-19 hospitalized patients are 15% or more of the hospitalized patients. Currently in Travis and Williamson Counties area, the 7-day average is running at around 3%.

Further Testing

Moderna continues their testing of children 12-15. However, no date has been established for their submittal to the FDA for EUA. Earlier this month the Pfizer vaccine had received EUA for children 12-15. Pfizer and Moderna are also testing children from 6 months to 11 years old.

Masks

The CDC finally lifted mask wearing both indoors and outdoors for those that have been vaccinated. But how do you determine if someone has been "vaccinated"? So there are still organizations that still require masks. This should have an impact on the rules for opening the Center. It might influence some people to get vaccinated who did not plan to.

New Vaccine Prospects

Besides AstraZeneca and Novavax, there are four (4) other vaccine candidates in development and are in Phase 3 of testing. No date has been given for EUA by the CDC for these four vaccines

The original Covid-19 virus continues to mutate (as they usually do). The current vaccines appear to have less efficacy against the latest strains. So it is important that you get vaccinated for Covid-19 as soon as possible. There are now several locations where vaccines can be obtained.

TOTH Vaccination Progress

As of May 16th, there is information on one hundred and fifty-one (151) members. One hundred and forty-three (143) have had their first dose including thirteen (13) who have received the one-shot Johnson & Johnson (J & J) vaccine. One hundred and twenty-eight (128) have had their 2nd dose. Only one has elected not to get the 2nd dose due to reactions to the 1st dose of Moderna. Seven (7) are not getting vaccinated at this time. However, three (3) had contracted the Covid-19 virus so are considered to be immune anyway. They may get vaccinated when the final stages of eligibility have been reached based on the recommendation from their doctors. Except for twenty-one (21) who received the Pfizer vaccine and thirteen (13) who have received the J & J vaccine, all others received the two-shot Moderna vaccine. We currently have listed about 277 members. We now have 141 fully vaccinated and three (3) who have contracted the virus. Thus over 50% of the Center members are relatively immune. The percentage is probably higher since I'm sure not everyone has reported.

However, there are several members of TOTH who do some exercising at the Cedar Park Recreation Center located off Discovery on Main Street. The cost for Cedar Park residents is \$60 per year and can be paid monthly or quarterly. Non-Cedar Park residents are welcomed, but the cost is \$10/month. There is no limit on how many times you exercise per month or what times during the open hours. The Rec Center has all kinds of exercise machines, treadmills, weights of all kinds, body building equipment and even an oval walking track on the 2nd floor that surrounds and is above the pickle ball and basketball courts.

Why not have a group of TOTH members meet at the Rec Center at least once a week say each Wednesday around 8:30 AM to greet and share in getting the body back into form. If you're new to this exercise routine, I or some of the other regulars can explain the workout machines and how to use them. Reaching Herd Immunity continues to be the 64 million dollar question. The key is how many people have been infected with the virus. An article published by the CDC in December 2020 was updated on January 15th, 2021. (www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/cases-updates/burden.html). In the article it was estimated around 83.1 million people of all ages had been infected in the US with the Covid-19 virus within an UI (Uncertainty Interval) of 95%. Over **twenty-one (21)** % were children under the age of 18. On January 15th, the confirmed cases total was 22.25 million. Hence the estimate of the 3-4 factor of estimated cases versus confirmed cases was derived. It is assumed that those that have been infected by Covid-19 have immunity, but for how long has not been determine. The efficacy variability is affected by the continuing new strains that are

being identified. Therefore, estimates of when we reach Herd Immunity are difficult. There are *many* variables which make any calculation very complicated and the resulting estimate suspect.

Another problem is that a high percentage of adults who are reluctant to receive a vaccination. One report last month stated only 69% of adults were willing to be vaccinated. Another report that has questioned over 18 million adults since April of 2020 shows about 23% of adults are hesitant to get vaccinated and that percentage has been holding as of February of this year.

In July, 2019 it was estimated that the population of the US was about 331 million people. Currently (April 16th) in the United States about 127.7 million have received their first dose of vaccine and about 80.6 million are fully vaccinated. The daily doses administered in the United States continue to fluctuate. However, since April 4th the daily vaccinations on a 7 day average were over 3.6 million. There was even one day when over 5.0 million total vaccinations were administered. If the percentage of adults not willing to be vaccinated continues to be over 20%, we may not reach the so called herd immunity percentage unless most of the reluctant vaccinators are among those that were infected but didn't know it and children under the age of 16 also get vaccinated. Hopefully with more and more evidence of no severe reaction to the vaccines and "no" deaths, most of those who are hesitant to be vaccinated will change their mind. The introduction of a third, one dose vaccine and the introduction of more facilities where you can be vaccinated should increase the vaccination rate. Of course, that was until the J & J vaccine was suspended until the CDC does a thorough investigation due to six (6) women ages 18-48 who suffered from a blood clot disease 6-13 days after receiving their vaccination. One person died. Over 500,000 people have received the J & J vaccine in the state of Texas without any reports of the blood clot reaction.

A mathematical formula that I developed that includes the latest estimated cases, current vaccination data and revised lower estimated efficacy rate still shows we would reach Herd Immunity (80% of population) in the United States by early July. As a positive note even if we don't reach full herd immunity, the daily cases and hospitalizations may be so low that it could no longer be classified as a pandemic. Let's hope.

As of April 16th, four months since the first vaccination was administered, total vaccinations for Texas and the two surrounding counties show the following:

^{*80%} of population and % includes fully vaccinated, estimated cases and a reduced average efficacy of the vaccinations of 75%. Of course this does not take into account the percentage of adults who decide not to get vaccinated and also children under the age of 16 may not be vaccinated until early summer.

The state of Texas has increased the daily vaccinations, however is estimated to reach herd immunity more than a week later than the US. Travis and Williamson Counties have also increased vaccinations significantly and are now running about two (2) weeks ahead of the state of Texas and are estimated to reach herd immunity in late of June. Next month, it will be interesting to see if the daily vaccination rate decreases. It could mean the reluctance of adults to be vaccinated is a reality and real Herd Immunity may not be attained. On Monday, March 29th Governor Abbott had open up the vaccination process to all individuals 18 and older. This could explain the rise in the 7-day average daily vaccination rate.

Further Testing

Pfizer tested children in the 12-15 age bracket and found those adolescents who received the vaccine produced strong antibody responses and experienced no serious side effects. Moderna is testing children ages 12 to 17. Both companies are testing children under the age of 12 years old including babies as young as 6 months. The Moderna study is expected to enroll 6,750 candidates in the US and Canada. AstraZeneca is also testing children. They have 300 volunteers ages six to seventeen. As many as 240 will receive the vaccine while the others a control meningitis jab.

New Vaccine Prospects

AstraZeneca is the fourth vaccine (two (2) dose) is currently being used outside of the US. Recently the data submitted for approval in the US has been shown to be outdated and has thrown another curveball in the saga of the company's vaccine approval in the US.

A fifth vaccine is on the horizon though. Promising early results secured Novavax a \$1.6 billion contract from Operation Warp Speed to produce 100 million doses of its Covid-19 vaccine effort. They hope to seek EUA in May. Pre-pandemic, the company was sinking and suffering setbacks after several failed phase three trials for other types of vaccines. Currently a UK study, which had 15,000 participants aged between 18 to 84 years, found that the Novavax vaccine was 96.4% effective against the original strain of coronavirus. What's more, the Novavax vaccine was also proven to be 86.3% effective against the Kent variant which has become the dominant strain of the virus in the UK over the winter. However, the Novavax vaccine (2 dose vaccine) was shown to have a much lower effectiveness, between 48.6 and 55.4% against the South African strain of the Covid-19 virus, highlighting the need for boosters.

The original Covid-19 virus continues to mutate (as they usually do). The current vaccines appear to have less efficacy against the latest strains. So it is important that you get vaccinated for Covid-19 as soon as possible. There are now several places where vaccines can be obtained.

TOTH Vaccination Progress: As of April 16th, there is information on one hundred and thirty-three (133) members. One hundred and twenty-four (124) have had their first dose including eleven (11) who have received the one-shot Johnson & Johnson (J & J) vaccine. One hundred and seven (107) have had their 2nd dose. Only one has not been scheduled yet, one (1) has their 2nd dose scheduled and two (2) are waiting for their 2nd dose to be scheduled. Eight (8) are not getting vaccinated at this time. However, three had contracted the Covid-19 virus so are considered to be immune anyway. They may get vaccinated, which is recommended, when the final stages of eligibility have been reached. Except for fifteen (15) who received the Pfizer vaccine and eleven (11) who have received the J & J vaccine, all others received the two shot Moderna vaccine. We currently have listed 270 members. Currently we have 118 fully vaccinated and three (3) who have contracted the virus. Thus almost 45% of the Center members are relatively immune. This percentage could even be higher since some of the current members do not actually attend any activities at the Center.

My belief is the criteria for reopening the Center will be based strongly on the individual's immunity. This and what other restrictions will be determined by the Board who plan to meet in early May. Please continue to report to me (if you haven't already) your vaccination status and what vaccine you received. Email me @ fjm81@austin.rr.com. It is important to tell me if you do not intend on getting vaccinated also. This is important so we can establish criteria for these individuals to enter the Senior Center. All this information will be keep strictly confidential and will only be known by me.

-3-COVID-19 UPDATE

The latest controversy is when will Herd Immunity be reached? Herd Immunity is reached when 70-85% of the population is immune. However, there is controversy over how do you determine how many people are immune. It's easy to determine the number people that have been fully vaccinated. In addition, others also count the people that have contacted Covid-19 that have recovered and those that were asymptomatic who have built up antibodies? An article published by the CDC showed that in December, 2020 it was estimated around 70 million people of all ages were asymptomatic with an UI (Uncertainty Interval) of 95%. Twenty % were children under the age of 18. It is assumed that those that have contracted Covid-19 have immunity, but for how long has not been determine. Other viruses such as the flu usual have at least 8 months immunity after vaccination, but those vaccines provide protection using the actual virus. The current vaccines prevent the virus from attack. We also don't know how long immunity lasts when you get the vaccine. Therefore, estimates of when we reach Herd Immunity is difficult. There are *many* variables which make it very complicated.

Something else to consider in regards to the vaccines is the efficacy against the new strains (United Kingdom, African, etc.). It's been reported that the two dose vaccines are slightly less effective against these strains, but still are highly effective. Even if you do contract it after the vaccine, the symptoms are less severe and the potential for death is very low. So when will we reach Herd Immunity and end the pandemic? There was an excellent article in the NYT by Matthew Conlen and Charlie Smart dated Feb. 20. http://www.nytimes.com/interactive/2021/02/20/us/us-herd-immunity-covid.html. The curve shows fully vaccinated based on a vaccination rate of 1.7 million per day we would reach herd immunity (70% of US population) by sometime in late October of this year (vaccinations only). A second curve shows the estimated Total Immunity which also includes those that had the virus and have recovered. This shows we would reach herd immunity in July. I don't believe they included the asymptomatic.

In July, 2019 it was estimated that the population of the US was about 331 million people. Currently (March 16th) in the United States about 72 million have received their first dose of vaccine and about 39 million are fully vaccinated. The daily doses administered in the United States continue to fluctuate daily. However, since March 6th the daily total doses vaccinations per day on a 7 day average is over 2.1 million. There has been several days with over 2 million vaccinations. The severe winter storm in mid-

February hinder both the delivery and the administering of the vaccinations. But the delivery and administering of the vaccinations are increasing. Two (2) weeks after the first dose one could be as much as 50% immune. However, there are estimates that as much as 35% of the eligible vaccination population may not want to be vaccinated. Based upon having 80% of the population being vaccinated to reach herd immunity we would not reach herd immunity if this continued. Hopefully with more and more evidence of no severe reaction to the vaccines and "no" deaths, those who are reluctant to be vaccinated will change their mind. I have developed a formula which includes the estimated asymptomatic cases and current vaccination data. The calculations show we would reach Herd Immunity (80% of population) in the United States by early July to mid-July. By the way, my pharmacist friend from El Paso says the hospital community there believes we will reach herd immunity by mid-July. Time will tell if our predictions hold.

As of March 16th, three months since the first vaccination was administered, the following total vaccinations for Texas and the two closest counties show:

^{*80%} of population and % includes vaccinations, recoveries, estimated asymptomatic cases and an average efficacy of the vaccinations of 80%.

As the one dose vaccine comes into wider use, the daily vaccination rate should increase. The fully immunized daily rate (although not with the same efficacy) will also increase.

The state of Texas has increased the daily vaccinations and my calculations show Texas is running about 2-3 weeks behind the US to reach herd immunity. In Travis and Williamson County, herd immunity is lagging Texas by around 2-3 months at the current rate of vaccinations. The Johnson and Johnson vaccine has now been approved for EUA (Emergency Use approval). The study showed 66% efficacy against moderate to severe cases and 85 percent effective in preventing severe disease across all regions studied, and showed protection against COVID-19 related hospitalization and death beginning 28 days after vaccination. However, originally only 20 million doses were scheduled for delivery in the US by the end of March. The government stepped in and Johnson & Johnson and Merck joined forces and promise to deliver 37 million doses by the end of March. It

will be interesting to see if the one (1) dose vaccine impacts the daily rate fully vaccinations. If the rate of vaccinations should increase, the overall efficacy will decrease. The offset should not have much impact on the estimated herd immunity date. I also understand both Pfizer and Moderna are testing candidates under 16 years old to determine the best dosages for the vaccine and if there are any severe reactions.

AstraZeneca is a fourth vaccine and is a two (2) dose vaccine. Although it is currently being used outside of the US, it is expected to submit new data to the FDA later this summer to obtain EUA. The data submitted for approval outside of the US had several variations including different doses and lack of adequate 65 and older participants. This is why the efficacy varied considerably.

The original Covid-19 virus continues to mutate (as they usually do). The current vaccines appear to have less efficacy against the latest strains. So it is important that you get vaccinated for Covid-19 as soon as possible. Austin Public Health (APH) has established a system where every Monday you can go online and try to get an appointment for the following week for as long as there are openings.

As of March 17, there is information on one hundred and fourteen (114) members. Eighty-nine (89) have had their first dose including seven (7) who have received the one-shot Johnson & Johnson (J & J). Forty-eight (48) have had their 2nd dose. Two (2) have their first dose scheduled, sixteen (16) are still trying to scheduled their first dose, twenty (20) have their 2nd dose scheduled. Seven (7) are not getting vaccinated at this time. However, two had contracted the Covid-19 virus in late December so are considered to be immune anyway. They may get vaccinated, which is recommended, when the final stages of eligibility have been reached. Except for eleven (11) who received the Pfizer vaccine and seven (7) who have received the J & J vaccine, all others received the two-shot Moderna vaccine.

I'm trying to collect this information to better determine when we might be able to open the Senior Center after the water damage repair is completed. My belief is we won't consider opening until a sufficient number of members have been vaccinated. Those entering the Center will probably have to show that it has been at least 2 weeks since they had their first dose of the two dose vaccines or the one dose vaccine. Also

the normal pandemic procedures of masks, social distance as best we can and sanitization will probably be in force. (To be determine by the Board). However, as of March 10, Governor Abbott has waived the penalty for not wearing masks and has open businesses to fully operate. Basically, he is putting the responsibility to prevent the spread of Covid-19 in the hands of the people. I'm sure many people will continue to wear mask, social distance, wash hands and sanitize facilities until told not to do so by the so-called experts.

Please continue to report to me (if you haven't already) your status in regards to Covid-19 vaccination and which vaccine you received. You can also tell me when your 2nd dose is scheduled in the future. Email me @ fjm81@austin.rr.com. I will keep a tally of the results and issue the total numbers again next month.

COVID-19 UPDATE

Well Covid-19 vaccinations are in full swing using the two (2) vaccines approved by the FDA for EUA (Pfizer and Moderna). We currently have as many people who have received their first vaccination as there are recorded cases of Covid-19 in the United States. A third vaccine, which has less efficacy than the other two, submitted their data for EUA in the 2nd week of February. Most of their data was developed against the new African strain of Corona virus. So it is difficult to compare against the previous two (2) vaccines. Hopefully AstraZeneca will have approval by the time you receive this article. Members of TOTH and other senior citizens are still having trouble actually making an appointment for their first shot. Those that have registered, have registered at more than one location. Several have required assistance from a relative in registering. Completing the online forms is not easy.

As of February 17, 40 members, have reported to me. Only two (2) have received two doses of the vaccine, nineteen (19) have had their first dose, seven (7) have their first dose scheduled, five (5) have their 2nd dose scheduled and thirteen (13) are trying to scheduled their first dose. Only one (1) has considered not being vaccinated. All those vaccinated received the Moderna vaccine.

The reason I'm trying to collect this information is to better determine when we might be able to open the Senior Center. My belief is we won't consider opening until a sufficient number of members have been vaccinated. Those entering the Center will at least have had their first dose of the two dose vaccines or the one dose vaccine. Also the normal pandemic procedures of masks, social distance as best we can and sanitization will probably be in force. (To be determine by the Board).

It is estimated that about 225 million people in United States 16 and older will need vaccinations in order to reach what is called herd immunity (about 80% of that population immunized). Currently in the United States about 55 million vaccinations for Covid-19 have been given. Of course this includes 2nd doses of a vaccine. Until the last 2 days, we had seen several days with 2 million vaccinations. But the severe winter storm has made it almost impossible to administer any vaccinations. Even so, after the first dose one could be as much as 50% immunized. Based on this data it's estimated sometime in August before we reach herd immunity in that population. In Texas, herd immunity for 16 and older population is about 18,000,000, in Travis County 815,000 and in Williamson County 370,000.

As of February 16th, two months since the first vaccination was administered, the following total vaccinations for Texas and the two closest counties shows:

Currently, in Texas, the 2nd dose is running vaccinations rate at around 40% of first doses. In the last two (2) weeks, the daily vaccination rate has only increased less than 10%. As the one dose vaccine comes into use, the daily vaccination rate should increase because of this and since it does not require low storage temperature. The less stringent storage means the vaccine can be used in remote areas easier. The fully immunized daily rate (although not with the same efficacy) will also increase.

Base on the data above and the current rate it would be late in December before Texas reaches herd immunity in the 16 and older population. In the US, it's estimated this would happen 5 months earlier. So Texas "must" increase the daily vaccinations to meet the same time frame. I understand Pfizer is testing candidates in the 12-15 year old range to determine the best dosages for the vaccine and if there are any severe reactions.

The original Covid-19 virus continues to mutate (as they usually do). The current vaccines appear to have less efficacy against the latest strains. So it is important that you get vaccinated for Covid-19 as soon as possible.

Please continue to report to me (if you haven't already) your status in regards to Covid-19 vaccination and which vaccine you received. You can also tell me when your 2nd dose is scheduled in the future. Email me @ fjm81@austin.rr.com and inform me. I will keep a tally of the results and issue the total numbers again next month.

COVID-19 UPDATE

As of early January 2021, there were 2 vaccines available. Pfizer-Bio Tech which was authorized for emergency use (EUA) by the FDA on December 11th and Moderna which followed one week later. Deliveries across the country started the week of December 15th for the Pfizer vaccine and about one week later for the Moderna vaccine.

<u>Pfizer vaccine</u> – This vaccine has the most challenging storage requirements. It has an initial storage temperature of -70 +/- 10 degs. Centigrade. (-94 degs. Fahrenheit). They are shipped in special containers with dry ice. There are two (2) sizes of boxes. One contains 25 vials and another 95 vials. Each vial after dilution contains 6 doses. There are three options for storage.

Special freezers @ the low temperature for six months.

The Pfizer thermal shippers (boxes) can be used as temporary storage by refilling with dry ice every five days for up to **30 days storage**.

Refrigeration units that are commonly found in **hospitals**. The vaccine can be refrigerated for **five days** at 2-8 degs. C (~ 36-46 degs. F.)

The vaccine requires two (2) doses with 21 days between doses. Fifty million doses were distributed starting Dec. 18; 1.3 billion are planned in 2021 (not all for US). Side effects include fatigue, headache, chills, muscle pain, especially after second dose. You should not get the vaccine if you have a history of serious allergic reactions or reactions to vaccine ingredients including polyethylene and poly sorbate.

Moderna vaccine – This vaccine will arrive frozen between -25 and -15 degs C (-13 and 5 degs. F), each box shipped contains 10 multi-dose vials (100 doses). The vials do not need dilution. The vaccine can be refrigerated for **thirty days** at 2-8 degs. C (~ 36-46 degs. F.). Once a vial has been punctured, it can't be refrozen. The vaccine requires two (2) doses with 28 days between doses. 20 million doses were distributed starting Dec. 21; 80 million for US are planned for 2021. Side effects include fever, muscle aches, headaches lasting a few days. Worst after second dose.

There is a third vaccine on the horizon, AstraZeneca. However, it has not been submitted to the FDA for EUA. In addition, the current testing shows it is only 70% effective compared to Pfizer and Moderna that are 95% and 94.1% respectively. AstraZeneca plans to have 3 billion doses distributed in 2021. Once again not all for US.

It is estimated that between 180 and 210 million people in United States 16 and older will need to be vaccinated in order to reach herd immunity (about 75% of population

immunized). It appears it could be at the end of 2021 before we reach this goal. In addition, it is not known how long the immunity will last. If it is only one year, this means we would have to start vaccinations all over again in 2022.

Vaccine Priority Groups

Phase 1A

• Health care personnel

Long term care facility

Phase 1C

• People ages 65-74

Phase 1B

• Frontline essential workers

• People 75 and older

Phase 2

People 16 and older not in Phase 1

• People 16-64 with high risk conditions

Other essential workers

In Texas, they are vaccinating people in the 1A and 1B Priority Groups. However, it appears that for the 1B group not enough vaccines doses have been distributed to HEB and ARC, so no appointment times are being scheduled till they receive enough vaccine. However, that all change on Monday, January 11th when Governor Abbott established a new hub system Covid-19 vaccine distribution program. Initially there were "NO" hubs in Williamson Co.

Long Term Care facilities have two options to choose from to receive the Covid-19 vaccine. Option 1: Pharmacy partnership: CVS and Walgreen Pharmacies will be able to enroll directly with CDC and receive Covid-19 vaccine at multiple locations across the state. Option 2: Enroll and become a provider with DSHS. Once a LTC facility is enrolled, DSHS will be able to directly ship Covid-19 vaccine to the LTC facility to be stored and used at that site. As of **January** 16th, very few facilities have signed up.

The vaccination process in Texas the first month was described as chaotic. In the first two weeks, only about 35% of the eligible individuals were vaccinated. As of January 16th, of the 1.72 million doses shipped, about 1.1 million Texans had been vaccinated. That's an average of 34,680 per day. If we want to reach herd immunity in a year, we will need to average almost 47,000 vaccinations per day. There have been about 167,000 that have been fully vaccinated. Obviously the vaccination process must improve to increase the daily vaccinations.

Information from above was obtain from online sources or Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS).

Personal Experience

My wife Ann, found out she was a 1A candidate. She was encouraged to get the vaccination both from her employer and our son, a doctor. Prior to finding out about the locations, I went to CVS Pharmacy at Lakeline Mall Blvd. and inquired if they were giving vaccinations. They said they were not and did not have any idea when they might be. However, they did tell me HEB at Lakeline Blvd. was giving them. I called on January 5th and they had one appointment available the next day. My wife got her vaccination after filling out some paper work. There is a 15 minute wait after the vaccination to make sure the patient does not have any serious reaction. The next day her arm was a little sore and she had a little fatigue for a couple of days. She will have to go online to register and make another appointment. She may have to go to another location to get her shot.

I initially tried to schedule an appointment at both HEB and ARC but was unsuccessful. After hearing about the new hub system, I was able to register online for a vaccination. You had to set up an account with Austin Public Health (APH) and then answer a few pages of questions. I registered on January 15th and was qualified to get vaccinated as part of the 1B category, but could not schedule an appointment. I was sent an email indicating they would advise me when they had receive enough doses to schedule me. On Sunday, January 17th I checked again and found a hub in Williamson County at Family Emergency Room (part of Family Hospital System). I registered again, only a few questions, and will be emailed a booking link to schedule an appointment. I'll get my shot at the first hub to respond. When that will be no one knows.

Also both HEB and ARC are not scheduling any first dose vaccinations due to not receiving anymore doses. Of course, this could all change when the new President takes office.

COVID-19 UPDATE

The Covid-19 pandemic continues. As of mid-December, cases, deaths and hospitalizations continue to rise in Texas. However, the light at the end of the tunnel has arrived with the approval for Emergency Use Authorization (EUA), Pfizer's two (2) dose vaccine. It is expected that Moderna's vaccine will receive the same approval the week ending December 19th. In fact, vaccinations have begun for certain health care workers and patients in long-term care facilities. It is expected that essential workers who work in food and agriculture, manufacturing, law enforcement, education, transportation, corrections, emergency response and other sectors will likely be second in line, starting early next year. Adults with underlying medical conditions and people over 65 are expected to begin during the first quarter of 2021. Of course, if more vaccines are approved, this could happen earlier.

Recently, I emailed to a group of friends observations from a Pharmacist who works in El Paso, a hot spot in regards to Covid-19 cases. The following are his observations:

During this Pandemic, the news has lagged the reality in Hospitals. The admission crisis abruptly ended, and admissions sharply dropped off. There are two reasons for this.

- 1) It is now two weeks after El Paso stepped up its lock-down enforcement and
- 2) 14 days after the Thanksgiving surge

We are expecting another surge to begin 6 days after Christmas, that will last for about 10-day after the New Year. That means we expect to see a rise in admissions again starting 12/30 and a return to "Normal Covid Levels" on January 10^{th} . It is clear to anyone working at the hospital that masks and social distancing are very effective at reducing the spread of the virus.

We are prepared to receive and administer the Pfizer vaccine. Each shipping container holds 5 trays, and each tray has 195 vials, each vial holds 5 doses that require reconstitution. Once removed from the Shipping-Container/freezer/refrigerator the vaccine must be administered in 6 hours. Through a combination of recharging the dry ice and refrigeration we can get up to 35 days of use.

About 20% of our staff are electing not to receive the vaccine. While it is still unknown, the FDA may recommend patients not receive the vaccine who have experienced severe allergic reaction to other antigens in the past. **Under any circumstances follow your doctor's recommendations.** Severe reactions include events that would send you to the ER. Other reaction signs include swollen tongue, difficulty breathing, and hives.

As more and more vaccinations are administered, we should be informed of any side effects and if the efficacy remains above 90%. Continue to wear masks, social distancing and wash and sanitize your hands.
